Baptism - Why and How Part 2

Now that we have learned that baptism is a public proclamation of our identity as followers of Christ, let's take a look at why and how we baptize.

Many different things might cause a person to pursue baptism. Some joined the crowd because their friends or family members got baptized and it seemed like the thing to do. Others have gotten baptized because they thought it was something they were supposed to do, or even had to do. but what are solid, biblical reasons to be baptized?

By returning to the story of Saul we can see why one would aspire to baptism. Saul is first mentioned in Acts 7:58. We read that he was a committed religious young man who held the coats of others while they stoned the first-century Christ follower, Stephen to death. This certainly does not present him as a friend or follower of Christ. Saul even went so far as to approach the high priest of his day and request official temple records so he could persecute people who converted from his faith to become Christ followers. But then something happened to Saul as he traveled to the ancient city of Damascus. Here is the story from Acts chapter 9.

3 Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. 4 He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" 5 He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. 6 But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." (Acts 3-6 NRSV)

Saul surrendered his life to Christ. He was changed from a person who depended upon his own good works to a Christ follower who learned to follow Christ so fully that he later say: "For me, living is Christ..." (Philippians 1:21 NRSV)

Most of us will never have a dramatic conversion experience like Saul, and that is okay. Conversion is not merely trying to do better or working harder (continued on next column)

to be a good person. Conversion to become a Christ follower is realizing like Saul, that Christ is life.

And this is why we, as part of the Baptist tradition, immerse in baptism. The immersion is not mystical, nor does it have special powers. In some respects, baptism is a drama in three acts.

Act I

Entering the Water

This reminds us of Christ willingly facing crucifixion by entering into this world as a human being over 2,000 years ago. We celebrate and remember this each year at Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.

Act II

Immersion

Immersion reminds us that Christ was buried by being placed into a tomb.

Act III

Rising from the Water

This third act depicts Christ's resurrection from the dead.

Later in Saul's life he wrote a letter to the church at Colosse and explained baptism's symbolism this way:

Going under the water was a burial of your resurrection, God raising you from the dead as he did Christ. When you were stuck in your old sin-dead life, you were incapable of responding to God. God brought you alive right along with Christ! Think of it! All sins forgiven, the slate wiped clean, that old arrest warrant canceled and nailed to Christ's cross. (Colossians 2:11-14 The Message) Baptism by immersion into water depicts the image of Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. It also represents the death and resurrection of our old way of living and resurrection to our new identity in Christ.

Act III

Rising from the Water

Coming out of the water represents Jesus' amazing resurrection from the dead. It shows that we have been given new life with Christ!

Baptism is a way to show everyone that we believe in Jesus and want to follow him forever. It's a special moment where we declare our love for him in front of our friends and family. Just like Saul's life changed, our lives will change too when we surrender to Jesus.
