

As we were having lunch on Easter Sunday, enjoying the wonderful food on the table, I was reminded of the story about the difference between Heaven and Hell. The story goes that someone in Hell was explaining to an Angel what Hell is like. The person explained that there is an abundance of food in Hell that looks so wonderful. Anything you can imagine is there for the taking, but they cannot eat any of it. The Angel asks why, and the person explains that their spoons are 3 feet long, and their elbows do not bend, so they cannot get the food into their mouths. They are all hungry, and everyone is frustrated and angry. The Angel explained that it is exactly the same in Heaven. They have all the food anyone can dream of to eat; their spoons are also 3 feet long, and their elbows do not bend, but they are able to eat everything and enjoy one another's company. The person from Hell asks how that is possible, and the Angel explains, "In Heaven, we feed one another."

This past week, I was reflecting on Dwayne's sermon on forgiveness last Sunday and thinking about the polarized world we live in. Some days I can't help but wonder what is going to become of our country? Are we going to end up as refugees somewhere, sometime in the future? There seem to be so many people, many of whom claim to be devout Christians, whose divisiveness and hatred and anger seem to be threatening our way of life. I have found that some of these people are actually my friends and extended relatives, and I wonder, "How is it possible that I can be friends and acquaintances with so many people whose opinions and beliefs are so different from my own?" But what is the alternative?

I was thinking about forgiveness in this context. Now you are probably thinking, "What does that have to do with forgiveness?" I think forgiveness is not something you need to extend only when someone has wronged you or caused you harm in some way. Sometimes, you need to extend forgiveness and acceptance to those around you who do not share your beliefs and values. Because lack of forgiveness can create anger and hostility in yourself, which can create the same divisiveness that you blame the other person for. I do not know about you, but I find it is easier to overlook things and forgive friends and relatives for having beliefs I feel are misguided, because I have a relationship with them. I find it is more difficult to forgive and accept a stranger or someone I do not have a close relationship with for being "part of the problem."

(continued from column 1) All of these thoughts brought me back to the story about Heaven and Hell. I've been wondering, if I am sitting around the table with a 3 foot long spoon and the person sitting across from me is someone who has wronged me in some way or perhaps hasn't wronged me but is someone who is outspoken, whose beliefs are so different from my own, would I feed them? Would you? Dear Heavenly Father,

We come before You today, joined by Christians throughout the country and across the world, to worship You and praise You. We thank You for the incredible sacrifice You made on the cross at Calvary. We thank You for Your grace and unfailing love.

We pray that You will open our hearts to the message today. Help us to keep the commandments You have given us by teaching us to love one another as ourselves - as You love us.

Help us to see the world around us, with all its flaws and imperfections, and find a way to express love and kindness to those around us, regardless of their viewpoints and their actions. Help us to learn to accept and forgive those whose beliefs we find offensive.

Fill our hearts with joy so that Your light will shine upon all those we meet in the week ahead. For we know only Your light can unite us. Help us to remember that if we cannot forgive others, we break the bridge we also must cross, because each of us has a need to be forgiven.

I ask this in Your name, that Your will be done on earth as it is in Heaven. Amen.
